"Caitlin is so happy she can do this because she loves Sr. Catherine. She's a second mother," said Isabel Pereiras, Caitlin's mother.

"I wanted to do this since the beginning because Sr. Catherine has always touched my heart," said Caitlin, 13. "She has done so much for our school and for our community. She really deserves this."
